5. Find two examples of the abbreviation that means “Father of his Country.” _____

6. Find two examples of slightly different abbreviations for “Tribunician Power.” _____

One of them is followed by Roman numerals. How many years had the emperor held the title? _____

7. Which coin tells us that the emperor was in his fifth consulship? _____

8. Find two coins that include the abbreviation for “by the decree of the Senate.” _____
