**pridie** - the day before

N.B. – Eight months follow this pattern, but there are four months which have the **Nones** on the 7<sup>th</sup> and the **Ides** on the 15<sup>th</sup>.  
Remember: *In March, July, October, and May, the Ides are on the 15<sup>th</sup> day.*
